Using an intersectional and anti-colonial lens, it depicts feminist storytellers of the 1970s-90s taking hold of cutting-edge analogue media technology to document everything from racism in the women's movement, to how to insert a diaphragm. But the film also addresses what it means to have an independent media; to, as one of the film's subjects put it, "take hold of the means of production."
