Course content	Students choose a diploma seminar in the scope of literary and cultural studies. The seminars are offered for both British and American literature and cultures. The seminar's goal is to prepare each student for writing a diploma thesis in accordance with all formal and methodological requirements as well as with respect to intellectual property rights. The basic assumption is that students choose the subject of the seminar according to their own interests and negotiate the thesis topic with their supervisor. In class, seminar students discuss the general content of their theses, get acquainted with methods of working on research sources (both primary and secondary) and select particular issues for analysis. They also learn the rules for writing and structuring academic works, as well as gain practical knowledge on using IT tools for writing a thesis.

Course content	The course has a dual focus. In terms of language, the goal of the course is to revise and practise skills and systems needed for writing a research paper and an MA thesis. In terms of content, the course develops skills necessary for evaluating and discussing the subject matter in the scope of the MA seminar and for producing texts within its domain. The course involves reading and writing summaries, abstracts and articles which bear characteristic stylistic and/or rhetorical features of the genre. The different genres to be analysed are related to the academic content of the chosen field of MA study. Ancient philosophy covers the Pre-Socratics, Socrates, Plato and Aristotle, as well as selected schools of ancient philosophical thought (e.g. Stoics, Sceptics, Epicureanism). Medieval philosophy introduces major theological ideas, including St. Augustine and Thomas Aquinas. Modern philosophy until the 19th century focuses on the ideas of Descartes, Pascal, Hobbes, Spinoza, Leibniz and the Enlightenment, e.g. Locke, Bacon, Rousseau, Hume and Kant. The 19th century topics focus mostly on German idealism and the Marxist thought. Contemporary philosophy covers psychoanalysis, phenomenology, post-Marxist thinkers, and deconstruction. The lectures enable students to have a better grasp of modern philosophy and other humanities.
