Medieval philosophy introduces major theological ideas, including St. Augustine and Thomas Aquinas. Modern philosophy until the 19th century focuses on the ideas of Descartes, Pascal, Hobbes, Spinoza, Leibniz and the Enlightenment, e.g. Locke, Bacon, Rousseau, Hume and Kant.
