Course content	<p>Students choose a diploma seminar in the scope of linguistics. The seminars are offered for theoretical or applied linguistics, thus specific content depends on the selected area and subject matter of a seminar held by the supervisor. The seminar's goal is to prepare each student for writing a diploma thesis in accordance with all formal and methodological requirements as well as with intellectual property rights. The basic assumption is that students choose the subject of the seminar according to their own interests and negotiate the thesis topic with the scientific supervisor. In class, seminar students discuss general content of their theses, get acquainted with methods of working on research sources (both primary and secondary) and select particular issues for their analysis. They also learn rules for writing and structuring academic works, and get familiarized with the software packages currently used in the humanities, applicable databases, and other resources.</p>

Course content	The goal of the course is to provide students with a broad perspective on the study of language. The course will highlight the connection between studies of language, cognition, societal phenomena, and culture. It will also discuss the place of linguistics against the background of other disciplines, such as history, psychology, social sciences and natural sciences. Topics may include (but are not limited to) such areas as language acquisition, language diversity and change, analysis of various types of discourse, communication in the media, intercultural communication, issues and research approaches in translation studies. Courses are designed by the teaching staff and reflect up-to-date research in the above mentioned areas. Students choose one course from the list of courses currently on offer. The list of courses as well as their content are updated every year, and thus may vary from one year to another.

Each module develops a specific area of academic competences. The course will look at academic vocabulary, grammatical structures, and expressions typically found in scientific works, with a focus on MA theses. Students will learn how to formulate arguments concisely and clearly and cite publications appropriately using the chosen referencing style. Another important element of the course is to raise awareness of intellectual property and copyright laws and their application in writing academic works.

Course content	The lectures present selected issues in Western Philosophy, from the antiquity to modern times, with a focus on philosophers from the English-speaking countries. Ancient philosophy covers the Pre-Socratics, Socrates, Plato and Aristotle, as well as selected schools of ancient philosophical thought (e.g. Stoics, Sceptics, Epicureanism). Medieval philosophy introduces major theological ideas, including St. Augustine and Thomas Aquinas. Modern philosophy until the 19th century focuses on the ideas of Descartes, Pascal, Hobbes, Spinoza, Leibniz and the Enlightenment, e.g. Locke, Bacon, Rousseau, Hume and Kant. The 19th century topics focus mostly on German idealism and the Marxist thought. Contemporary philosophy covers psychoanalysis, phenomenology, post-Marxist thinkers, and deconstruction. The lectures enable students to have a better grasp of modern philosophy and other humanities.
